*"The Lemon Project"*— Robert Vinson, University Professor of Teaching Excellence, History and Jody Allen, Visiting Assistant Professor of History — In 2009, after student and faculty resolutions calling for a full investigation of the College's past, the Board of Visitors acknowledged that the College had "owned and exploited slave labor from its founding to the Civil War; and that it had failed to take a stand against segregation during the Jim Crow Era." As a result, the Board offered its support for the establishment of The Lemon Project: A Journey of Reconciliation. The Project is named for Lemon, a man who was once enslaved by the College of William & Mary. The Lemon Project is a multifaceted and dynamic attempt to rectify wrongs perpetrated against African Americans by the College through action or inaction. An ongoing endeavor, this program will focus on contributing to and encouraging scholarship on the 300-year relationship between African Americans and the College, and building bridges between the College and Williamsburg and Greater Tidewater area. — Andrews 101

*"A Chemist's Journey Through Color"*— Elizabeth Harbron, Associate Professor of Chemistry, 2011 recipient of the W&M Thomas Jefferson Award for Teaching — Many of the colors in the world around us come from carbon-based molecules. We will explore the molecular origins of color and dyes as well as the colorful glow known as fluorescence. Starting with what makes red red and ending up at how a color change can be used as a sensor for toxic metals, we will journey through the world of color from a chemist's perspective. — ISC room 1127

*"Filmmaking, Visual Communication, and Media Production in Undergraduate Learning"*— Jes Therkelsen, Environmental Science and Policy, W&M filmmaker-in-residence — As William and Mary's Teaching Filmmaker-in-Residence, I provide students the opportunity to create technically proficient digital video productions through production courses, inter-disciplinary collaborations, independent studies, and honor projects. Teaching media production within a liberal arts environment like William and Mary gives students the cultural, historical, and theoretical context to explore visual storytelling skills such as story development, production planning, digital videography, directing, lighting, non-linear editing, and sound design. Through the application of media production, I hope for students to become more aware of our visual culture, to stop passively absorbing it, and to begin to actively engage in it.
